Blanket bog discovery day

A Mountaineering Ireland Club Environmental Officer Workshop

Kippure - Saturday 25th March 2017

The overall aim of the day is to provide Environmental Officers with an introduction to the blanket bog habitat found on many of Ireland's mountains (the formation, flora and fauna and uses of blanket bogs) and to brief participants on Mountaineering Ireland's current work on access and conservation matters. The workshop will be delivered in conjunction with the Irish Peatland Conservation Council (IPCC). The IPCC is a charity which aims to conserve a representative sample of Irish bogs for future generations to enjoy. The day will start in Kippure Estate (www.kippure.com), from where we will car-pool to and from the Liffey Head bog area.

PROGRAMME

Indoor Session (9.30 – 11.00am), Kippure Estate (for directions see: http://kippure.com/travel-directions.htm).

- Introduction to the day, overview of Mountaineering Ireland's current work on access and conservation, including Mountaineering Ireland's vision for the future of Ireland's mountains and upland areas (Helen Lawless, Mountaineering Ireland).
- Information talk on the work of the Irish Peatland Conservation Council, blanket bog habitat and the IPCC's new Citizen Science Blanket Bog Survey (Nuala Madigan, IPCC)

Field Trip (11.15am - 4.30pm) with Nuala Madigan & Helen Lawless

This workshop will continue outdoors with a visit to Liffey Head Bog the source of the River Liffey and an area of outstanding beauty within Wicklow Mountains National Park. During a walk across the wet bog participants will explore the variety of peatland plants, take time to discover the wetland invertebrates by doing a pond dipping session and discuss the value of blanket bog habitat for all the people of Ireland. We will then ascend Kippure, where we will encounter other upland habitats, such as heath, grassland and eroding blanket bog, and discuss the possibilities for bog restoration in the uplands.

Participants will be encouraged to contribute to the discussions and share their own ideas about how their club members could take action to help protect Ireland's mountains, including our blanket bogs. Participants will be provided with sample surveys that they can complete and submit to the

Irish Peatland Conservation Council to assist with the IPCC's citizen science project by reporting their views on the state of blanket bog habitat throughout Ireland.

At the end of the field trip the group will return to Kippure Estate for a very brief wrap with the aim of finishing by 5.00pm.

Nuala Madigan

Nuala Madigan is the Environmental Education Officer with the Irish Peatland Conservation Council and for the past eleven years has facilitated workshops with schools and community groups throughout the island of Ireland. Nuala is passionate about Irish peatlands accepting that they have been a source of fuel for this country but believes with so many alternatives available today it is time to celebrate and highlight the hidden values of Irish peatlands including their carbon storage and water holding capacity as well as the unique flora and fauna of these habitats.

As we want as many clubs as possible to benefit from this opportunity, places will initially be limited to one per club. Second preference will be given to other representatives of Dublin/Wicklow clubs, Mountaineering Ireland representatives on other organisations and Mountaineering Ireland training providers.

NOTES FOR PARTICIPANTS

- As we will be outdoors for much of the day, and crossing some rough and boggy terrain, participants should have full hillwalking gear, including suitable footwear, raingear, a packed lunch and something to drink.
- o Camera, binoculars, a notebook and field guides (if you have them) will all be useful.
- Plans for the field trip may be adjusted on the day depending on weather conditions or the needs and interests of the group.
- To minimise environmental impact and enable all participants to hear what is said while we're outdoors, this workshop is limited to a total of 15 participants.
